Elderly lady in distress seeks saviour



I have some sad news of one of the older Elizabethan 29s. Steve Mellors, who is the proud new owner of "Florya", No. 2, came across "lolare" in a sad state. She is listed as No.6 in the Peter Webster book, but currently carries the number 5 on her sails. I know from experience that the hull number of these early boats is not always passed on. I feel that the EOA is here to help both boats and owners, and "lolare" is in desperate need of someone who is looking for a serious boatbuilding challenge. The next step will be to break her up, I fear.

She is currently ashore in Gweek classic boatyard, having suffered some hull damage forward of the keel and lost some windows. The internal joinery appears to have been partially ripped out, possibly to access the hull when it was damaged. I believe the yard will accept any offer, if you are going to pay

She is one of the earliest builds from 1963 or 1964. The external iron keel is bolted on, the rudder and all cockpit seats and coaming will be wooden of course, and the deck and internal layout is spookily familiar to me. Hull and deck are fairly thick, solid grp and wood has been used in a lot of the construction: to form the deadwood, beam shelf and foredeck king plank, as well as the internal plywood bulkheads and joinery. The mast is still standing with the mainsail and roller furling rigged, she looks complete if not intact.

The first is the fuel filler cap, which in his case is on the cockpit sole. Does anyone else have this and is it as much of a problem as it sounds with water ingress?

The second is the position of the chain pipe. On Blue Liz this comes down through the centre of the forecabin, do you think could he move it right forward without affecting structural integrity? My uninformed comment there would be to check if the deck is solid or cored, as this will make a difference to how you seal the hole. Phil is based on the north coast of Northern Ireland.

Steve Mellors has purchased Florya, No. 2. He will be shipping her from Scotland down to Falmouth soon, if he hasn't already done so.
